

The Reception year, the final year of the foundation stage of education, is the year in which preparation is made for more structured learning in Key Stage 1. By the end of the Foundation Stage most children will achieve age related expectations (also known as a good level of development).

Don't be surprised if when you ask your FS child 'What did you do today?' they reply with 'I did some playing!' At Hurstbourne Tarrant Church of England Primary School we follow the County Agreed Syllabus for Religious Education (RE) - Living Difference a concept driven curriculum. We teach predominantly the Christian religion but in line with the syllabus we also teach about other world faiths. RE offers children the opportunity to discuss and debate the big questions of life whilst comparing this with the belief systems of the Christian faith. We find that as well as direct teaching of religious matters, values can be taught by emphasising good examples as they occur in each child's daily life at school. We consider the link built up with the church, school and family are of vital importance and a keystone of the child's religious development. If for some reason you do not wish your child to take part in RE sessions at the school, you may request that they are withdrawn. We always suggest that this is done after a conversation with the class and Head teacher.

worship should offer Collective opportunities to explore and share beliefs; consider the importance of prayer, reflection and silence; think about the needs of others and develop a sense of community; and, appreciate the importance of religious beliefs to those who hold them.

Each day there is an act of worship, whether as a whole school or as a class. Once a week, the local vicar leads worship in St. Peter's Church. Children learn songs, hymns, and prayers from a variety of sources, both traditional and modern. The school also takes full part in celebrating the various Christian festivals throughout the year. Special Educational Needs

Each child is nurtured at our school and is treated as an individual. Staff are constantly reviewing children's progress and future needs. If a child is considered to have a specific problem in learning, (a specific learning difficulty) e.g. in spelling, reading or mathematics, then extra time will be allocated to that child to give the appropriate specific help. Such programmes of work will be developed with the agreement of the child's parents.

In the cases where a child may have more pronounced learning difficulties, the process of obtaining fuller professional help for the child in the form of an Early Health Care Plan (previously known as a statement) will be carried out in full consultation with the parents and as swiftly as the system allows.

More detailed information regarding the school's Special Educational Needs Policy and the procedures involved in identifying and dealing with such cases is available on the School website.

Pupil Premium

Children who are entitled to free school meals are automatically registered to be eligible for Pupil Premium. This money is paid directly to the school for us to put extra resources in place to ensure that these children achieve as well as everyone else. 

leave the school site, parents will be given details in advance and asked for their consent. The school budget does not extend to funding these out of school experiences and we are not allowed by law to charge for these activities. We do however ask parents if they would make a voluntary contribution to cover the costs involved. The friends of the school also contribute 50% towards the cost of the coaches to try to keep the cost of activities to a minimum.

The Friends of Hurstbourne Tarrant School work together to raise money to buy extra equipment such as interactive whiteboards, whole class musical instruments and they also subsidise half the cost of all coaches for school trips.

There are a variety of fundraising and social events throughout the year culminating with a Summer Fayre in the summer term. Membership is open to all parents, carers and anyone associated with the school. Everyone is welcome.

School Council

The School Council is made up of 1 representative from each year group. Regular meetings are held to discuss and decide on a range of issues affecting the children. Recently, they have helped with interviewing staff. The children are also responsible for organising charity days. Children are democratically elected for a year and voting takes place in school after children have made speeches and created campaign posters.



The school governors have important legal and supervisory functions in the school's management. They hold regular meetings and have informed knowledge of the life of the school. Working in conjunction with us, they ensure that the requirements of the Education Reform Act 1988 and supplementary statutory obligations are fulfilled. The normal term of office for a governor is four years.


School Terms and Holiday Dates
